Ruth Rendell (1930 - 2015)

- Born as Ruth Barbara Grasemann, in London, daughter of two teachers; father English, mother Swedish – not a happy marriage
- Lonely childhood escapes were literature and her own imagination
- At age 7, family moved to Essex, where she lived through high school
- Did not go to college, went into journalism, but always felt constrained by facts
- After high school, she became a feature writer for her local Essex paper, the *Chigwell Times*; however, she was forced to resign after filing a story about a local sports club dinner she hadn't attended and failing to report that the after-dinner speaker had died midway through the speech.
- Married Donald Rendell, a political reporter, in 1950 (divorced 1975, remarried 1977, he died 1999); one son Simon, born 1953
- While home with son, she started an intensive program of reading, learning French and classical Greek
- Started writing fiction, submitting novels to publishers
- 1964: first Wexford novel published
- Also wrote psychological suspense and psychological thrillers some under pen name of Barbara Vine (Barbara = middle name, Vine = great-grandmother)
- Lived in 15th C cottage in Suffolk
- 1997: named a Baroness, joined House of Lords, member of Labour Party; active in environmentalism, children's rights, literacy
